



## IT'S GOING TO FREEZE!!! WHAT DO I DO???



Make sure pots and plantings are watered well. (Pay special attention to beds under trees and eaves.) Dry plants are more susceptible to freeze damage.



Cover tender plants with burlap, a floating row cover, a Planket, a "cloche", or an old blanket or sheet. Do not use plastic, and make sure the material goes all the way to the ground.



If containers can easily be moved, tuck them into your garage or garden shed. Remember that plants in containers need to be hardy to two zones colder or need protection. (E.g. Seattle is USDA Zone 8, but container plants need to be hardy to Zone 6.)



You may see bulbs pushing foliage out of the ground. This is generally not a concern. If it snows, that will give them protection. If you are really concerned, a light mulch would be fine (but remove it in the spring).



Don't prune when it's freezing, and avoid planting until temperatures moderate.
