

SKY NURSERY FRUIT TREE LIST 2012

In general, properly trained dwarf trees range from 6-10' when full grown;
semi-dwarf trees range from 10-15'; standard trees are 15-25'+.

Some apples are available as a mini dwarf, which ranges from 4-6' tall
and can produce a half-box of fruit per tree when mature.

Trees marked WWFRF are varieties particularly recommended for the Puget Sound Region
by the Western Washington Fruit Research Foundation.

Varieties marked with an asterisk are new to Sky.

APPLES

APPLES \$34.99 EXCEPT AS NOTED

**Apples (except the combination trees and crabapple) require a compatible apple tree nearby for
pollination in order to set fruit. See our apple pollination chart for compatible pollinators.**

AKANE (DWARF) Medium sized red. Ripens early to mid September. Scab and mildew resistant. Firm, crisp, flavorful eating and dessert apple—superior to Red Delicious. *Pollination: other Sky apple variety except Gravenstein, Jonagold, Karmijn, or King. Rootstock M26 (Dwarf). WWFRF*

BENI SHOGUN FUJI (SEMI DWARF & DWARF) Russeted light red. Ripens early October. One of the sweetest apples for fresh eating. This is a special variety of Fuji which ripens earlier—a better choice for cool-summer regions such as Puget Sound. *Rootstock MM106 (Semi dwarf), M26 (Dwarf). WWFRF*

CHEHALIS (DWARF) Large, yellow-green. Ripens late September. Scab and mildew resistant. Crisp and juicy, good for cooking and eating. Similar to Golden Delicious but more reliable in our cool-summer climate. *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf). WWFRF*

COMBINATION APPLE (SEMI DWARF) An orchard in a single tree! Four or five varieties with different flavors and harvest times. Combination of Cortland (red, sweet), McIntosh, Summerred (early red), Yellow Delicious, and Yellow Transparent (large sweet yellow). *Pollination: self. Rootstock MM106 (Semi dwarf). \$42.99*

COMBINATION ESPALIER Six varieties in a formal espalier. Combination of Fuji, Gala, Gravenstein, McIntosh, Yellow Delicious, and Yellow Transparent (large sweet yellow). *Pollination: self. Rootstock MM106 (Semi dwarf). Three tier. \$49.99*

COX'S ORANGE PIPPIN (DWARF) A legendary heirloom dessert apple from England. Spicy, crisp, aromatic flesh with mellow aftertaste. Unsurpassed flavor! *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf).*

GALA (DWARF & MINI DWARF) Medium sized reddish orange. Ripens early October. Crisp, juicy, and aromatic—good fresh eating and a good keeper. *M26 (Dwarf), M27 (Mini dwarf).*

GRANNY SMITH (SEMI DWARF) The favorite tart green apple! Ripens early to mid-October. Firm, crisp, and flavorful. *Rootstock MM106 (Semi dwarf).*

GRAVENSTEIN (DWARF & MINI DWARF) Medium sized, yellow with red stripes. Ripens early September. Firm, crisp, tart and juicy. Considered one of the best all-around apples; great for cooking and eating. *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf), M27 (Mini dwarf).* **Not a good pollinizer for other varieties. WWFRF**

HONEYCRISP (SEMI DWARF, DWARF, & MINI DWARF) Medium red. Ripens mid September, but best flavor if picked mid October. Scab resistant, crisp texture, tart and sweet. Wonderful for cooking and eating. *Rootstock MM106 (Semi Dwarf), M26 (Dwarf), M27 (Mini dwarf).* **WWFRF**

JONAGOLD (DWARF) Large yellow and red. Ripens mid to late October. Heavy producer, good keeper. Firm, crisp, flavorful eating and dessert apple. *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf).* **Not a good pollinizer for other varieties. WWFRF**

***KARMIJN DE SONNAVILLE (SEMI DWARF)** Large russeted red. Ripens mid October. Scab resistant, very vigorous. This cross between Cox's Orange Pippin and Jonagold is one of the most flavorful apples ever bred. Firm, crisp, and juicy; very high in both acid and sugar. Excellent keeper; flavor mellows in storage. *Rootstock M7 (Semi Dwarf).* **Not a good pollinizer for other varieties. WWFRF**

KING (AKA TOMPKINS KING) (DWARF) Large, waxy yellow with red striping. Ripens mid to late October. Crisp texture, sweet flavor. Good for eating, cider, and cooking. *Pollination: other Sky apple variety except Jonagold. Rootstock M26 (Dwarf).* **Not a good pollinizer for other varieties. WWFRF**

LIBERTY (SEMI DWARF, DWARF & MINI DWARF) Medium sized red. Ripens early October. Scab and mildew resistant. Firm, crisp, and juicy. Excellent all-purpose apple; excellent pollinizer for other varieties. *Rootstock MM106 (Semi dwarf); M26 (Dwarf); M27 (Mini dwarf).* **WWFRF**

***MACOUN (DWARF)** Red skin, snowy white flesh. Ripens late September. One of the best apples for fresh eating: sweet, crisp, juicy, and aromatic. *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

***MELROSE (DWARF)** Large red. Ripens late October. Tart, crisp, and flavorful; one of the top-rated all-purpose apples for the Northwest. *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

SPARTAN (DWARF & MINI DWARF) Medium sized dark red. Ripens mid October. Crisp, juicy, semi-tart; good keeper, excellent all-purpose apple. Similar to McIntosh. *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf), M27 (Mini dwarf).* **WWFRF**

***WILLIAM'S PRIDE (DWARF)** Large red. Ripens early August. The best of the early apples: sweet, rich, spicy flavor. Trees are productive and disease resistant. *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

***WYNOOCHE EARLY (DWARF)** Medium sized fruit is yellow blushed red. Ripens early August, but keeps unusually well—until Christmas with refrigeration. Firm and crisp, with a rich full flavor, and thin skin. Delicious fresh, baked, or in sauce. Disease resistant. *Rootstock M26 (Dwarf).*

***ZESTAR (SEMI DWARF)** Large red. Ripens early August. Tart, crisp, and zesty with a hint of brown sugar flavor; crispest of the early apples. *Rootstock M7 (Semi Dwarf).*

COLUMNAR APPLES \$46.99

Grow as hedge or in pots. Will reach 7-12' tall, 3-4' in diameter if unpruned.

GOLDEN SENTINEL Large sized golden fruit. Ripens early October. Crisp, juicy, and sweet. Disease resistant and productive. *Pollination: other columnar apple. Rootstock M26.*

SCARLET SENTINEL Large yellow and red fruit. Ripens early October. Crisp and sweet with pure white flesh. Very tasty. Most dwarf of the columnar apples. Disease resistant and productive. *Pollination: Other columnar apple. Rootstock M7.*

CRABAPPLE (EDIBLE) \$49.99

DOLGO. Height and width 25-30 feet. Upright spreading shape. White flowers, red oval 1½" fruit. Tart and flavorful variety—great for making ruby red jelly. Great pollinizer for early and mid-season blooming apples. *Pollination: self.*

APRICOTS: \$34.99

HARGLOW (DWARF) Medium size bright orange fruit. Firm and very sweet, freestone variety. *Pollination: self. Rootstock St. Julian A (Dwarf).*

PUGET GOLD (DWARF) Medium size golden orange fruit. Ripens early August. Firm and very sweet, good producer for the Pacific Northwest. Developed by WSU. *Pollination: self. Rootstock St. Julian A (Dwarf).*

CHERRIES

CHERRIES \$39.99 EXCEPT AS NOTED

All Dwarf trees are on rootstock Gisela 5.

BING (DWARF) Large, dark red. Ripens early July. Sweet, firm, and juicy. Vigorous, heavy producer. Subject to cracking if it rains heavily near harvest time. *Pollination: Rainier or any self-fertile Sky cherry variety. WWFRF*

COMBINATION CHERRY (SEMI DWARF) Extended harvest, pollination, and four or five different delicious flavors on a single tree. Combination of Bing, Rainier, Sam (large black), Stella, and Van (medium black, crack-resistant). *Pollination: self. Rootstock Mazzard F-12 (Semi Dwarf).* **\$42.99**

COMBINATION ESPALIER Extended harvest, pollination, and three different delicious flavors on a formal espalier. Combination of Bing, Lapins, and Rainier. *Pollination: self. Rootstock Mazzard F-12 (Semi Dwarf).* **Three tier. \$49.99**

LAPINS (DWARF) Large, black. Ripens mid July. Sweet, firm, good flavor; similar to Bing. Resistant to cracking. *Pollination: self.* **WWFRF**

MONTMORENCY PIE (DWARF) Small, bright red pie cherry. Ripens early July. Sweet-tart and juicy; good for pies and canning. *Pollination: self.* **WWFRF**

RAINIER (DWARF) Large, yellow with pink blush. Ripens early July. Sweet, firm. Good variety for the Northwest. *Pollination: any other Sky cherry variety.* **WWFRF**

STELLA (DWARF) Large, dark red. Ripens early July. Sweet, firm, and juicy. Resistant to cracking. *Pollination: self.*

FIG

FIGS \$16.99 AND UP DEPENDING ON SIZE, VARIETY

Fig trees, though quite tropical looking, are actually cold hardy to about 10°F and thrive in the Pacific Northwest. Fig trees can reach 25'; pruning can keep them smaller. For best fruit production, plant figs in a sunny location where they'll get plenty of heat, such as against a south-facing wall. Figs can produce two crops each year. The first, called the breba crop, is produced on last year's growth and typically ripens in July to August. The second, main crop, is produced on the current year's growth and may not ripen in cooler summers.

BROWN TURKEY (AKA VERN'S BROWN TURKEY) Mahogany skin, sweet amber flesh. Will sometimes bear two crops a year. Place against south or west facing wall. *Pollination: self.*

***CHICAGO HARDY (AKA BENSONHURST PURPLE)** Purple skin, dark red flesh. Sweet rich flavor; small fruit. Once established, it can freeze to the ground and still produce a good crop. Excellent for containers. *Pollination: self.*

DESERT KING Green skin and strawberry colored flesh. Ripens in mid August. Very reliable producer; good one to try in cooler areas where other varieties may not ripen. Fruit good fresh or for drying. *Pollination: self.*

LATTARULA (AKA ITALIAN HONEY) Green skin, honey-colored flesh. Ripens in early fall. Good producer, fruit superb for fresh eating, canning or drying. *Pollination: self.*

NEGRONNE Striking dark, almost black fruit with dark red flesh. Good choice for containers or small spaces. Ripens September. *Pollination: self.*

***OSBORNE PROLIFIC (AKA NEVERALLA)** Dark purple to brown skin, amber to peach flesh. Sweet rich flavor. Fast growing, excellent producer. *Pollination: self.*

PETITE NEGRA Black skin, sweet red flesh. Very dwarf tree grows only to 8'—excellent for containers, small spaces. Delicious and juicy. *Pollination: self.*

***TEXAS (EVERBEARING)** Brownish-yellow skin, amber flesh. Bears young and gives a good crop in cool season areas. Fruit ripens over long period. Large bush form to 12-15 feet. *Pollination: self.*

MULBERRY \$21.99

Mulberries are nicely formed ornamental trees with lush, tropical-looking foliage. The fruit is like a large, juicy, very sweet blackberry. The trees will reach 30 feet but can be kept smaller with pruning. Mulberries like at least a half day of sun (full sun all day is better) and well-drained soil. All varieties are self-fertile.

ILLINOIS EVERBEARING Delicious berries ripen continuously throughout July, August, and September. Red fruit turns black when it ripens. Abundant producer from an early age.

NOIR OF SPAIN Short, fat, black fruit with excellent flavor. *Pollination: self.*

OSCAR Sweet, juicy fruit can be eaten red for a more raspberry-like flavor or let ripen fully to black for more sweetness. Considered one of the most flavorful mulberries. Good fresh or dried.

***PENDULA (WEEPING)** Stake it to the desired height, and then it will grow in a wide arc to the ground. Small, sweet, reddish black fruit.

***PAKISTAN** Huge 3" berries have a sweet complex flavor. Can be harvested when red for a tarter berry. Needs heat to ripen well. *Pollination: self.*

WELLINGTON Very heavy cropper; considered the best mulberry at the New York testing center. Sweet black fruit ripens over several weeks.

WHITE Sweet, juicy fruit is white with a slight red blush when ripe. Birds are less attracted to the lighter colored fruit. Good fresh or dried.

NECTARINE

GOLDEN PROLIFIC DWARF Medium to large size fruit, yellow flesh. Freestone with good flavor. Ripens mid August. Genetic dwarf to 4-6', with beautiful pink blossoms. *Pollination: self.* **\$39.99**

HARDY RED (SEMI DWARF & DWARF) Red skinned with golden blush, yellow flesh. Promising new variety for the Northwest. Excellent flavor. *Pollination: self. Rootstock St. Julian A (Dwarf), Mariana 2624 (Semi Dwarf).* **\$34.99**

RED SUNSET DWARF Large bright red fruit. Ripens mid August. Very productive, freestone. Ripens early July. A genetic dwarf to 4-6' with very pretty flowers. *Pollination: self.* **\$39.99**

NUTS:

ALMOND, BOUNTY Thin-shelled, sweet flavored almonds. Comparatively late bloomer—does well in Northwest. This is a true almond, not a natural peach-almond cross—20 foot tree has beautiful fragrant pink flowers in spring. *Pollination: Nikita's Pride Almond or any peach.* **\$29.99**

ALMOND, HALL'S HARDY Thick-shelled, strong flavored almonds. Comparatively late bloomer—does well in Northwest. It's thought to be a natural peach-almond cross—20 foot tree has beautiful fragrant pink flowers in spring and disease-resistant foliage. *Pollination: self.* **\$34.99**

ALMOND, NIKITA'S PRIDE Thin-shelled, sweet flavored almonds. Late bloomer—bred in Russia for cool-season production, does well in Northwest. This is a true almond, not a natural peach-almond cross—20 foot tree has beautiful fragrant pink flowers in spring. *Pollination: Bounty Almond or any peach.* **\$29.99**

CHESTNUT, COLOSSAL Large, easy to peel nuts are delicious roasted or boiled. Large, spreading tree to 25' or more; very productive. *Pollination: any other Colossal seedling or other chestnut variety.* **\$89.99**

***FILBERT, ETA** Roundish, tasty, medium size nuts (filbert/hazelnut). Handsome, rounded small tree; filberts can also be planted close and pruned as a hedge. Bred by OSU for resistance to Eastern filbert blight. *Pollination: any other filbert variety.* **\$32.99**

***FILBERT, THETA** Small to medium hazelnuts. Long bloom time makes it an excellent pollinizer for other filberts, increasing their yields. Bred by OSU for resistance to Eastern filbert blight. *Pollination: any other filbert variety.* **\$32.99**

WALNUT, CARPATHIAN Large, stately tree with compound leaves and an attractive branching pattern. Carpathian walnuts produce the same sweet, flavorful, thin-shelled English walnuts as are sold commercially, but are more cold-tolerant than the Persian varieties grown in California. *Pollination: partially self-fertile, but production is higher with another English walnut tree.* **\$34.99 & \$74.99**

***WALNUT, CASCADE** Like Carpathian, but nuts are exceptionally large and flavorful. Rated #1 walnut by the North American Nut Grower's Association. *Pollination: partially self-fertile, but production is higher with another English walnut tree.* **\$34.99**

***WALNUT, IDAHO** Like Carpathian, but extra cold-hardy. Nuts are large and sweet. *Pollination: partially self-fertile, but production is higher with another English walnut tree.* **\$64.99**

OLIVE: \$24.99

Olive trees are picturesque, stately evergreens hardy to about 10° F. They require full sun and well-drained soil. For maximum ripening, plant against a south or west facing wall in full sun.

ARBEQUINA Early ripening Spanish variety. Starts bearing at a young age—good for oil or eating olives. *Pollination: self.*

PAW PAW \$24.99

Pawpaws produce exotic, huge (up to 1 pound) fruit with a soft texture and sweet banana-like flavor. The tree is a beautiful addition to your landscape—pyramidal shape, slow-growing to 10', with large tropical-looking leaves. Unlike most fruit trees, pawpaws will produce fruit in partial shade. Pawpaws ripen early September to late October; pick fruit when it is beginning to soften and color has changed to greenish yellow. Pawpaws are also unusually rich in vitamins and minerals; one serving (100g, about ¼ a large fruit) has three times the vitamin C of apples, twenty-two times apple's zinc, and over half the RDA of iron.

***SHENANDOAH** Late-ripening; abundant, large fruit with creamy yellow flesh and few seeds. Succulent, custardy texture; sweet mild flavor, delectable aroma. One of the largest and most flavorful varieties yet bred. A farmer's market favorite. Patented. *Pollination: any other pawpaw variety.*

***SUSQUEHANNA** Late-ripening; the largest and sweetest variety yet developed by the Peterson breeding program. Firm buttery texture (similar to avocado); fewest seeds of any variety; rich flavor. Peterson's own favorite. Patented. *Pollination: any other pawpaw variety.*

PEACH

CHARLOTTE (SEMI DWARF) Yellow-orange, large, freestone fruit. Ripens late August. Good flavor, yellow flesh. *Resistant* to peach leaf curl and bacterial canker. *Pollination: self. Rootstock: Lovell (Semi dwarf).* **\$29.99**

FROST (DWARF & SEMI DWARF) Yellow-orange medium to large size fruit. Ripens mid August. Good flavor, yellow flesh. *Resistant* to peach leaf curl! Good for fresh eating or canning. *Pollination: self. Rootstock St. Julian A (Dwarf), Mariana 2624 (Semi Dwarf).* **\$34.99**

GOLDEN GLORY DWARF Genetic dwarf (4-6') with large, freestone fruit. *Pollination: self.* **\$39.99**

Q1-8 (SEMI DWARF) Sweet, juicy, flavorful white-fleshed fruit. Ripens mid August. *Resistant* to peach leaf curl! Easy to grow—a great choice for home gardeners. *Rootstock: Lovell (Semi dwarf). Pollination: self.* **\$29.99**

PEAR, ASIAN

ASIAN PEARS \$34.99 EXCEPT AS NOTED

CHOJURO (SEMI DWARF) Medium size, flattened, light brown. Ripens mid September. Very crisp, firm and aromatic. Good keeper. Productive tree. *Pollination: any other Asian pear. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).*

COMBINATION ASIAN PEAR (SEMI DWARF) A combination of four or five varieties- includes yellow and brown. Combination of Chojuro, Hosui, Kosui, Nijiseiki, and Shinseiki. *Pollination: self. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).* **\$42.99**

HOSUI (SEMI DWARF) Very large, golden with russetting. Ripens early September. Crisp, juicy, and very sweet. *Pollination: any other Asian pear. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).*

KOSUI (SEMI DWARF) Medium size, flattened, russeted bronze. Ripens late August. Crisp, sweet, and aromatic. Tender skin. *Pollination: any other Asian pear. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).*

NIJISEIKI (AKA 20TH CENTURY) (SEMI DWARF) Medium size, round, yellow-green. Ripens mid September. Mild flavor, firm and juicy. Most popular cultivar. *Pollination: any other Asian pear. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).*

SHINSEIKI (SEMI DWARF) Medium to large size, round, yellow. Ripens late August. Very crisp, juicy and aromatic. Stores well. Productive tree. *Pollination: any other Asian pear. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).*

PEAR, EUROPEAN

EUROPEAN PEARS \$34.99 EXCEPT AS NOTED

ANJOU (DWARF) Large, rounded shape. Light green. Ripens late September. Fine texture, firm and juicy; keeps well in refrigerator. Pick unripe and ripen off tree. *Pollination: any other pear. Rootstock Province Quince (Dwarf).*

BARTLETT (DWARF) Large, yellow. Ripens early to mid September. Sweet and tender, good fresh or canned. *Pollination: any other pear. Rootstock Province Quince (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

BOSC (SEMI DWARF) Large, narrow shape. Dark green and russeted. Ripens early October. Highly rated flavor, good for eating fresh or canning. Pick unripe and ripen off tree. *Pollination: any other pear. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).* **WWFRF**

COLETTE (SEMI DWARF) High quality, medium sized pear. Waxy yellow with pink cheeks. Sweet and juicy, non-gritty, with a spicy flavor. Everbearing—starts ripening in August, continues until frost. *Pollination: any other pear. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).*

COMBINATION PEAR (SEMI DWARF) Enjoy four or five pear varieties on a single tree. Choose among Anjou, Bartlett, Conference (large, yellow, juicy), Red Bartlett, and Rescue. *Pollination: self. Rootstock OHxF333 (Semi dwarf).* **\$42.99**

ORCAS (DWARF) Large, yellow blushed red. Ripens mid September. Sweet and mild, good fresh, dried, or canned. Scab resistant. *Pollination: any other pear. Rootstock Province Quince (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

RESCUE (DWARF) Large; orange-yellow skin. Ripens late August. Sweet and mild, good fresh, dried, or canned. Good producer. *Pollination: any other pear. Rootstock Province Quince (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

UBILEEN (DWARF) Very large, early ripening pear with international award-winning flavor. Greenish blushed red. Ripens mid August. Vigorous and disease resistant. *Pollination: any other pear. Rootstock Province Quince (Dwarf).*

PERSIMMON

Persimmon trees make a beautiful addition to any landscape. They normally stay in the 12' range. Persimmons have bright yellow and orange fall color and brilliant reddish orange fruit that hangs on the branches well into November. They require very little pruning and tolerate wetter soil conditions than most other fruit trees. As with all fruit trees, plant in a sunny warm location for best fruit production. Astringent persimmon varieties should be picked when fully colored then brought inside to finish ripening. When very soft, astringent varieties can be eaten fresh or used for baking. Non-astringent varieties can be eaten when still firm like an apple. Note: Persimmon trees break dormancy based on heat, so newly planted persimmon trees may not break dormancy their first season if we have a cool spring. They may not leaf out until summer or even fall their first year.

FUYU (AKA JIRO) Round and flat, bright orange fruit. Non-astringent type; may be eaten fresh off the tree. Sweet mild flavor. Usually seedless. *Pollination: self.* **\$99.99**

FUYU (IMOTO) Squarish, flat, bright orange fruit. Non-astringent type; may be eaten fresh off the tree. Sweet mild flavor. *Pollination: self.* **\$74.99**

IZU Medium size, golden orange fruit. Earliest ripening of the good quality Asian persimmons. Non-astringent type; may be eaten fresh off the tree. Sweet spicy flavor. *Pollination: self.* **\$64.99**

SAIJO Japanese type. Small conical red fruit with spicy brown flesh. Astringent type—let finish ripening off the tree. Ripens earlier than Fuyu; usually seedless. A good bearer. *Pollination: self.* **\$64.99**

PLUM AND PRUNE

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BEAUTY (DWARF) Asian type. Bright red, medium size fruit similar to Santa Rosa. Ripens early August. Sweet and juicy, rich blend of flavors. Tree productive and fast growing. *Pollination: other Asian variety except Shiro. Rootstock St. Julian A (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

BROOKS (DWARF) **Prune type.** Medium-large, dark purple. Ripens early September. Sweet and juicy, very similar to Italian. Good fresh, for drying, or for canning. Freestone. *Pollination: self. Rootstock: St. Julian A (Dwarf).*

HOLLYWOOD (DWARF) Asian type. Dark red, large fruit. Ripens late August. Sweet and firm, good fresh or in jelly. Tree has showy flowers and purple leaves. *Pollination: other Asian variety except Shiro. Rootstock: St. Julian A (Dwarf).*

IMPERIAL EPINEUSE (DWARF) European type. Medium sized oval fruit, purple-blue skin with yellow flesh. Freestone. Firm, sweet flesh good fresh or for drying. *Pollination: self. Rootstock: St. Julian A (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

ITALIAN PRUNE (DWARF) **Prune type.** Medium, dark purple. Ripens early September. Sweet and juicy, firm. Good fresh, for drying, or for canning. Freestone. *Pollination: self. Rootstock St. Julian A (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

SATSUMA (DWARF) Asian type. Deep red, medium size fruit. Ripens mid August. Deep red flesh, juicy, flavorful. Tree productive and fast-growing. *Pollination: other Asian variety except Shiro. Rootstock: St. Julian A (Dwarf).*

SHIRO (DWARF) Asian type. Large, round yellow fruit. Ripens early August. Sweet and juicy. Good fresh or cooked. *Pollination: Santa Rosa or Satsuma. Rootstock: St. Julian A (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

SHIRO (DWARF) Asian type. Large, round yellow fruit. Ripens early August. Sweet and juicy. Good fresh or cooked. *Pollination: another Asian variety. Rootstock: St. Julian A (Dwarf).* **WWFRF**

PLUM, JAPANESE FLOWERING

Japanese Flowering Plum. Beautiful ornamental tree is covered with deliciously fragrant bright pink flowers in February. Tart, apricot-like fruit is yellow blushed with red; can be eaten fresh, dried, or pickled in salt to make Umeboshi. Naturally semidwarf tree grows to about 15 feet. *Pollination: self.*

Back when everyone made jelly or preserves, quince was a part of every farm's orchard for its aromatic fruit. A gnarled small tree or large shrub, quince is a great ornamental as well. It is covered with fragrant white flowers in the spring and golden fruit in the fall.
